

- Mass Awareness Drives: Campaigns in villages and urban slums on topics like child marriage, child labour, and the importance of education.
- School-Based Programmes: Workshops on hygiene, sanitation (Swachh Bharat), and safe touch, conducted across dozens of government schools.
- Community Camps: Camps providing basic social security schemes linkages support

#### 2. Deep, Sustained Intervention (2,318 Children Directly Impacted)

This is where we measure transformative change. These children are part of our core, long-term interventions, including:


- Remedial Education Centres: Daily academic support for children to bridge learning gaps and prevent dropouts.
- **Rescue & Rehabilitation:** Children saved from trafficking, labour, and abuse, who are now receiving shelter, counselling, and education.
- Girls' Empowerment Groups: Regular workshops and skill development sessions for adolescent girls.
- **Nutritional Support:** Children enrolled in our programmes who receive regular, nutritious meals to combat malnutrition.

# Beyond the Numbers: Understanding Our Approach

#### 3. Strengthening the Ecosystem (1,000+ Stakeholders)

A child cannot thrive in isolation. This year, we strengthened the protective net around children by training and sensitising key community members, including:

- Teachers & School Management Committees (SMCs): Trained on child-friendly teaching methods and their roles in ensuring school safety.
- Anganwadi Workers: Capacity building on early childhood care and identifying malnutrition.
- Panchayat Members & Village Leaders: Sensitised on child rights, the POCSO Act, and their role in local governance for child protection.
- Police Personnel: Workshops on handling cases of child abuse and trafficking with sensitivity.




Bal Kalyan Sangh has been actively engaged in addressing the pressing issue of cross-border trafficking in Bihar and Jharkhand. organization The implemented various initiatives aimed at vulnerable populations, empowering particularly young girls and women, to mitigate the risks associated with trafficking. Jharkhand has emerged as a critical source of trafficking, impacting the lives of countless girls and women. According to the Multidimensional Poverty Index 2021, this state is the second poorest in India, with a staggering 42.16% of its population living below the poverty line. The socio-economic conditions, compounded by a lack of viable livelihoods and educational opportunities, significantly increase the vulnerability of young women to trafficking. Those aged 12-15 are often targeted for domestic labor, further exacerbating this issue. To combat this alarming trend, Bal Kalyan Sangh launched the Security Guard Training program designed to empower girls aged 15-20 by providing them with essential skills and employment opportunities in the security sector under Swavalamban Program.

The selection of candidates for the Security Guard Training program involved a strategic approach. Bal Kalyan Sangh collaborated with local Panchayats and community leaders to identify at-risk girls. A clear set of selection criteria was established, focusing on age, economic background, educational status, family situation, and previous instances of trafficking. Home visits were conducted to engage with families, assess each girl's vulnerability, and determine her willingness to participate in the program. Final interviews were then conducted to shortlist candidates for the training.

The training program was intensive, spanning three months and comprising six days of instruction each week. The curriculum covered a range of topics, including security protocols, emergency response procedures, surveillance techniques, and customer service skills. To maintain a low trainer-to-student ratio of 1:15, personalized attention was provided to each trainee.


The training delivery mechanism included multiple components to enhance learning. In-person sessions were complemented by practical training, which involved mock drills and physical training for self-defense.



Upon completion of the training, Bal Kalyan
Sangh facilitated job placements for the
trained girls in various institutions. Partnerships
were established with organisations to create
employment opportunities, and graduates
received certificates to enhance their
credibility in the job market.

From vulnerability to vigilance empowering survivors to guard their own future

The training provided a comprehensive Computer Basics course, covering essential skills such as operating systems, word processing, internet usage, and troubleshooting. The program was conducted over three months in a residential setting, utilizing a blended learning approach that combined instructor-led and self-paced modules. Emphasizing hands-on practice, the training included offline learning materials and was customized to address the specific needs of the participants, including online safety and data protection. Progress tracking systems were implemented to monitor individual development, and post-training support was provided to link participants with further courses.



# WORLD DAY AGAINST TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS

#### From awareness to action

#### creating pathways of protection and empowerment.

**O**n July 30, 2024, Bal Kalyan Sangh held a State Level Consultation to commemorate the World Day Against Trafficking in Persons. This event aimed to raise awareness about human trafficking while promoting economic empowerment for women. The conclave attracted 100 participants, including government officials, civil society members, and trafficking survivors, underscoring a collaborative approach to combating trafficking.

The session featured insights from law enforcement and government representatives, who emphasized the need for preventive measures and better record-keeping of migrant workers. Key sessions focused on the intersections of cybercrime and trafficking, highlighting the necessity of education and stronger digital safeguards. Additionally, the rehabilitation of trafficking survivors was discussed, with an emphasis on comprehensive support strategies, including education and skill development.


The conclave strengthened the commitment to a multifaceted approach to combat trafficking and protect vulnerable populations. Key proposals included the establishment of trafficking units in metropolitan areas and clearer employment guidelines for children, which aimed at enhancing protection for at-risk individuals.

Throughout the reporting period, significant progress was achieved in line with the objectives of the Swavalamban Program. A total of 30 girls completed the Security Guard Training, while 20 girls participated in the Digital Literacy Training. The program successfully facilitated employment for 50 girls, providing them with earnings ranging from ₹9,000 to ₹12,000. Engagement with stakeholders was also noteworthy, with 100 individuals convened to promote awareness about trafficking.

A particularly inspiring story that emerged from the program is that of Mansi, who exemplifies resilience and the transformative power of opportunity. After facing exploitation in a domestic job, Mansi returned home and found hope through the security guard training program.









#### Our Unique Model:

#### Migration Resource Centre

Bal Kalyan Sangh (BKS) established the Migration Resource Centre (MRC) as a community-based model to ensure safe and informed migration, focusing on protecting children and families vulnerable to unsafe migration and trafficking. The MRC maintains a village-level database to track migrant families, conducts risk mapping, and supports children's access to education and care. It links families with key government schemes such as MGNREGA, PDS, Ayushman Bharat, and Labour Cards to reduce economic vulnerability. Through coordination with Panchayats, Labour Departments, and Childline 1098, the MRC facilitates migration registration, awareness campaigns, and reintegration support, promoting long-term family stability and community resilience.

Child Labour Day, Child Rights Day, National Girl Child Day



Eleven year old Soham Nag from Murhu Block, Khunti district has faced more hardships than most can imagine. Raised by a dedicated single mother, his world was shattered when she was accused of witchcraft and brutally attacked, leaving her permanently disabled and unable to work. With his father, a man entangled in substance abuse, long absent from his life, their sole source of income vanished. Survival suddenly took precedence over dreams, and Soham faced the harsh reality of dropping out of school.

When our facilitator learned of Soham's plight, the community network sprang into action. The easiest solution, a government school, was not what Soham needed. He was determined to stay at his private school. His reason was inspiring: the school was close to home, allowing him to care for his disabled mother during breaks.

Moved by his resilience, our team knew they had to find a way. The case worker and facilitator, joined by VLCPC members and Childline, launched a collaborative effort. They approached School, advocating tirelessly for Soham's right to free education under the RTE Act, which reserves seats for Economically Weaker Sections.

It was not an easy process. It required extensive paperwork and persistent follow ups, but the community refused to give up.

Their collective perseverance paid off. Soham was granted a full scholarship covering his tuition, books, and learning materials.

Today, Soham balances his studies while caring for his mother. His story is a powerful testament to the unwavering strength of a boy who refused to give up, and a shining example of what a determined community can achieve when it rallies together to support its most vulnerable.

On January 24, 2025, Bal Kalyan Sangh (BKS) commemorated National Girl Child Day by hosting a significant statelevel conclave at Audrey House in Ranchi. The event was themed "Preventing and Combating Child Trafficking, Unleashing the Potential Girls, and Celebrating the Resilience of Survivors.". It brought together over 500 participants, including girls from across the state, government officials, civil society organizations, and local stakeholders. event underscored BKS and Jharkhand's 25 years of unwavering fighting human commitment to trafficking, protecting vulnerable children in the state

#### National Girl Child Day Conclave 2024 Objectives and Strategic Actions

#### **Uniting Stakeholders**

The event's foremost goal was to bring together diverse stakeholders to foster collaboration. This was achieved by gathering government officials, the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC), and civil society partners on a single platform to strengthen community resilience against trafficking

#### **Raising Awareness**

A core objective was to highlight the vulnerabilities that lead to trafficking. This was addressed through powerful speeches, including an address by BKS founder Shri Sanjay Kumar Mishra, who emphasized the need for collective action and noted the successful rescue of 507 girls




#### **Empowering Survivors**

The event aimed to showcase the importance of supporting survivors. BKS emphasized its comprehensive approach of rehabilitation, counseling, education, and vocational training. This was powerfully illustrated by the personal testimonials of survivors Budhmani Ji and Sushma Ji, who spoke about the transformative impact of BKS's programs

#### Setting a Future Vision

A key action was to establish a long-term strategic roadmap. This culminated in the Honorable Governor of Jharkhand, Shri Santosh Gangwar, unveiling the BKS "Vision Document for 2030", a plan to guide future efforts in child protection



Balkunj, the Children's Home for Boys located in Chaibasa, West Singhbhum, continues to be a cornerstone for the care, protection, and rehabilitation of children in need of support. Currently providing a nurturing home for 44 children, the institution is dedicated to ensuring their shelter, education, and successful social reintegration.

When asked what name he'd like to be called by, the 16-year-old smiled and said, "Peter - like Spider-Man." Maybe it was because Peter believes in what every hero stands for -courage, kindness, and the will to help others.

He came to Bal Kunj when he was 9. In the beginning, he didn't like being here; everything felt new and unfamiliar. But slowly, the warmth of the caretakers and laughter of his friends began to feel like home. Now, he can't imagine his days without them -his "brothers," as he fondly calls them.

Peter recently passed his 10th class from a nearby government school after being among the toppers in Class 9 and is preparing to take admission for higher studies. His dream is to become a footballer like Cristiano Ronaldo – determined, disciplined, and full of spirit.

But Peter's heart is not just on the field; it's in the garden too. What began as a small curiosity turned into a quiet passion. He started planting seeds, caring for saplings, and soon inspired others to join him. Today, the garden at Bal Kunj is his favorite corner – a living reflection of how far he has come.

Always smiling, Peter has a way of brightening the place around him. He takes care of others, lends a hand where needed, and speaks with warmth that crosses languages -Hindi or Ho, it hardly matters.

When asked about his future, he says,

"When I grow up, I want to be a helping hand for others - like everyone here has been for me."

And perhaps that's what makes Peter truly heroic – not his strength, but his smile that keeps growing hope wherever he goes.



#### Empowering Villagers as Barefoot Negotiators to Unite Children with Families.

Bal Kalyan Sangh (BKS), in collaboration with the Jharkhand State Child Protection Society (JSCPS) under the Department of Women, Child and Social Welfare, Government of Jharkhand, and with the support of Miracle Foundation India, is implementing the "Saksham" program — a Family Strengthening and Family-Based Alternative Care Model in the Kolhan Division of Jharkhand.

The initiative focuses on empowering vulnerable families, preventing child separation, and ensuring every child grows up in a safe and nurturing family environment.



# Because, when families are supported, children thrive





#### **Strengthening Families**

In the aftermath of the pandemic, a 2021–22 vulnerability mapping exercise by NCPCR revealed that 7,026 children in East Singhbhum were living in high-risk conditions. To address these vulnerabilities, Bal Kalyan Sangh (BKS), in collaboration with the Jharkhand State Child Protection Society and supported by Miracle Foundation India, launched Project Saksham—a Family Strengthening and Family-Based Alternative Care model in the Kolhan Division.

The project also trained 30 youth as "barefoot counsellors" to provide psychosocial support and mobilized CWCs, DCPUs, and CCIs to promote Family-Based Alternative Care (FBAC). Between July 2024 and March 2025, 88% of children (447 out of 508) presented before CWCs were restored to family care East Singhbhum achieving a 97.1% restoration rate. Project Saksham stands as a testament that when families are strengthened, children thrive where they belong within families, not institutions.

#### **Securing Futures**

Focusing on Patamda, Boram, and Ghatshila blocks, the project re-identified 689 vulnerable families (1,136 children) and, using Miracle Foundation's Thrive Well methodology, found 480 families below the well-being threshold, requiring urgent intervention. The major gap identified was lack of essential documentation, excluding families from key schemes. Through coordinated block and panchayat-level camps, 200 families were successfully supported to government schemes.

#### Way Forward: Scaling the Family Strengthening Model

Building on the success of Project Saksham, Bal Kalyan Sangh aims to scale the Family Strengthening and Family-Based Alternative Care Model across other districts of Jharkhand. The focus will be on institutionalizing this model within the state child protection framework by integrating it with Mission Vatsalya and linking families to sustainable livelihood and social protection systems. The next phase will emphasize the formation and capacity building of Child Welfare and Protection Committees (CW&PCs) at the Panchayat level, strengthening aftercare and family reintegration services, and fostering a community-owned protection mechanism. By documenting the model's learnings and outcomes, making this as a replicable, evidence-based approach to ensure that every child grows up in a safe, caring, and empowered family environment.

#### SWACHHATA CAMPAIGN LED BY COMMUNITY CHAMPIONS



Bal Kalyan Sangh facilitated a community-driven Swachhata (Health & Sanitation) Campaign in the villages of Khunti, focusing on promoting hygienic practices, safe drinking water, and waste management. The initiative empowered children's groups (Bal Manch), village youth, SHG women, and Gram Sabha leaders to take collective action for a cleaner and healthier environment.

Key awareness activities included door-to-door sensitization, cleanliness drives, demonstration of handwashing practices, construction of compost pits, and mobilization of households to adopt toilet use and safe waste disposal. Special efforts were made to engage adolescents as Swachhata Ambassadors, nurturing leadership and ownership within the community.

The impactful community-led model and visible improvements in village sanitation were recognized at the state level. The campaign was featured on DD Jharkhand, highlighting it as a best practice of community participation to inspire other districts. This initiative strengthened local health-seeking behavior, reduced open defecation practices, and built collective responsibility towards sustaining a clean and dignified living environment.

# HUNAR SE UDAAN: ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN & FAMILIES




Bal Kalyan Sangh provided seed support for agriculture-based livelihoods to 30 vulnerable families, helping them improve household food security and reduce dependency on distress migration. Families were supported with quality seeds and guidance on seasonal crop planning and sustainable farming practices.

Alongside this, 10 SHG groups were supported in bamboo basket making, strengthening traditional skills into viable income-generating activities. Women's groups are now able to sell their products in local markets and community fairs, contributing to their economic independence.

To diversify livelihoods further, 100+ families were trained and supported in mushroom cultivation, including supply of spawns and low-cost growing units. This activity helped families, especially women, to generate regular income from home with minimal investment.





# DIGITAL SAFETY AND CYBER-ENABLED TRAFFICKING PREVENTION

BKS, in partnership with CyberPeace Foundation, trained 50 Master Trainers on Digital Safety and Cyber-Enabled Trafficking prevention. These trainers conducted awareness sessions in 50+ villages, reaching 10,000+ children, youth, parents, and community members through direct and indirect interventions. The initiative strengthened community vigilance, promoted safe digital behavior, and reduced the risk of online grooming and exploitation.

BKS, in partnership with CyberPeace Foundation, trained 50 Master Trainers on Digital Safety and Cyber-Enabled Trafficking prevention. These trainers conducted awareness sessions in 50+ villages, reaching 10,000+ children, youth, parents, and community members through direct and indirect interventions. The initiative is also creating youth champions known as "Digital Suraksha Mitra" (Digital Safety Friends), who act as peer educators and first responders within their communities, promoting safe online behavior and alerting peers about online risks and grooming attempts.





## खुल के बात करें : SRHR for Confident Adolescents

Bal Kalyan Sangh continued its focus on Adolescent Health and Sexual and Reproductive Rights (SRHR) with special emphasis on Menstrual Health and Hygiene. Through the "Chupi Todo Abhiyan" (Break the Silence Campaign), adolescents—especially girls—were encouraged to speak openly about menstruation, bodily changes, and emotional well-being without shame or stigma. Sessions were conducted in schools, Bal Manch groups, and community spaces to provide correct information on menstrual hygiene, nutrition, use and disposal of sanitary products, and addressing myths and taboos. Boys were purposefully included to foster respect, understanding, and supportive behaviors. The initiative promoted healthier practices, enhanced self-confidence among adolescent girls, and helped establish a positive, stigma-free environment around menstruation and SRHR issues in the community.

## Collaboration with National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR)



Under the initiative "SAMVARDHAN III: Vulnerability Mapping of Children and their Families Living in Difficult Circumstances," BKS partnered with NCPCR and conducted extensive field mapping across Koderma, Giridih, and Dumka districts, with support from IGEP India.

The initiative focused on identifying children at risk of exploitation, trafficking, and neglect, while strengthening local protection systems through data-driven interventions and family-level support.

BKS, in partnership with the Department of Labour, Employment, Skill Development and Training, Government of Jharkhand, organized the State-Level Multi-Stakeholder Dialogue on Eliminating Child Labour 2024, supported by the International Labour Organization (ILO), New Delhi.

The dialogue brought together policy makers, civil society, enforcement agencies, and community representatives to deliberate on strategies for eradicating child labour and promoting decent work. To bridge the gaps in access to social security and welfare schemes, BKS also facilitated multiple scheme enrolment camps through coordinated efforts at the state, district, and block levels, ensuring that vulnerable families are linked with entitlements and benefits.

Under the umbrella of Mission Vatsalya, BKS collaborated with JSCPS, Department of Women, Child and Social Security, Government of Jharkhand, to organize Orientation Programs for Child Protection Stakeholders across all districts of Jharkhand. These orientations, supported by Miracle Foundation India focused on building the capacities of officials, Child Welfare Committees, District Child Protection Units, and community-based structures on the Mission Vatsalya Guidelines, reinforcing a child-centred and family-based approach to care and protection. Through these multi-level collaborations, Bal Kalyan Sangh continues to advocate for systemic reforms, strengthen grassroots mechanisms, and promote collective action for ensuring that every child grows up in a safe, protective, and empowering environment.

The National Action and Coordination Group for Ending Violence Against Children, India (NACG EVAC India) is a country-level civil society forum of the South Asia Initiative to End Violence Against Children (SAIEVAC). It envisions a South Asia where all children, irrespective of gender, enjoy their right to a safe environment free from violence, abuse, exploitation, neglect, and discrimination. Constituted by leading child rights organizations, NACG EVAC India plays a crucial role in coordinating and advancing the Ending Violence Against Children (EVAC) agenda of SAIEVAC at the national level, in close collaboration with the SAIEVAC government mechanism. Bal Kalyan Sangh, supported by Terre Des Hommes Netherlands, was one of the active partner organizations contributing to this national effort, amplifying children's voices from Jharkhand and advocating for stronger community-based child

- Child Marriage
- Child Sexual Abuse and Exploitation (including Online Safety)
- Corporal Punishment
- Child Trafficking
- Child Participation

Additionally, the consultation addressed three cross-cutting themes Children with Disability, Gender, and Children's Rights & Environment with a special focus on Climate Change.

The event brought together children's representatives from 18 States and Union Territories including Delhi, Haryana, Rajasthan, Bihar, Nagaland, Telangana, Karnataka, Tripura, Tamil Nadu, Kashmir, Manipur, Andhra Pradesh, Uttarakhand, West Bengal, Odisha, Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, and Jharkhand to deliberate on key protection issues, share lived experiences, and propose actionable solutions for eradicating violence against children.

## The Way Forward

In the coming year, Bal Kalyan Sangh will continue to strengthen its family-centric approach to child protection, ensuring that children grow up in safe, nurturing and empowered environments. The focus will be on holistic development of children, promoting education, life skills, emotional well-being, and active participation through Bal Manch and adolescent groups. To support families and reduce vulnerabilities related to poverty, migration and early marriage, the organization will expand initiatives on livelihood and skill development, particularly for youth and adolescent girls, enabling them to access dignified and sustainable livelihood opportunities.

Traditional and local skills will be promoted alongside digital and financial literacy to improve income security. Communities will be further empowered through awareness, collective action and strengthened local protection structures, ensuring that they play an active role in safeguarding children's rights. Recognizing the growing digital exposure of children and youth, BKS will also integrate cyber safety, responsible digital behaviour, and basic AI awareness into its education and youth empowerment programs, preparing young people for a safe and informed future. This integrated approach will ensure that education and empowerment progress hand in hand, leading to resilient families, confident youth, and safe, supportive communities.







